Our Christmas and New Year's Eve parties

We had 40 people attend our Christmas party and the launch of our pizza oven. 50

pizzas were cooked on the night. Well done in particular to Chris and Matt for producing a terrific pizza dough and doing the cooking. Hot work on a hot night.

On New Year's Eve we exceeded our Christmas party numbers with 46



attendees plus 6 children, and again the pizza oven was fired up and we had wonderful pizzas plus a feast of other food. One person said to me: 'It's amazing - all the salads have gone and there is still some dessert left'.

Both occasions were a lot of fun.

Macleod Organic Community Garden News!

Construction

The pizza oven had its seven firings and was launched with great success on 15 December at our Christmas party. So far it has cooked close to 100 pizzas. The polytunnel will be ready either Saturday or the next warm day for its plastic to be stretched and secured. Putting the plastic



covering on, requires a hot day for best results. The heat allows it to be pulled tight and this prevents flapping in the wind and wear and tear.

Planting, weeding, watering and that very hot day!

We pulled out all weeds and plants that were finished, and which we were not saving for seed, so that they didn't compete for water in the hot weather. In addition we mulched everythiing in sight and deep watered in the week before the 41 degree day plus put up shade cloth where possible. We had no discernible damage on that 41 degree day other than a few sunburned tomatoes when one of the tomatoes collapsed under the weight of its fruit, exposing the fruit which would normally be protected by the leaves above it. We fixed this by tying the branches higher up the stake and removed the damaged fruit. (Sunburn shows as white patches or blisters and is irreversible).

The rhubarb garden was treated to shade cloth on top of the trellis and a curtain of it facing the west side. This proved interesting as it did not cover one plant on one end and two on the other and these 3 plants were quite wilted after the very hot day but those behind the curtain were fine. Members have reported sunburn to fruit such as apples and berries in their gardens when shade cloth was not used.

The bale garden is fully planted and progressing well. We've learned a few tricks that will improve next year's bale garden. In the end, because of the

need to prepare the garden for the hot weather, we reduced the number of bales from 20 to 10 and used the spare 10 to mulch the zucchini and fruit trees.

Watering has been much reduced this year primarily because there has been sufficient regular rainfall and the trees are established. We have given each fruit tree about 27L of tank water compared to about 100 L to the same time last year when they were just coming into their second summer and required this support.

Harvest

Lettuce, rainbow chard, rhubarb, carrot, beetroot, leeks, cucumber, zucchini, tomato, basil, herbs, strawberries, red currents, apricots, peaches, figs and a few beans.

We need the following for the garden:

- shade cloth urgently!
- sieves of any kind (household or garden)
- watering cans
- buckets
- worms
- worm wee
- large plastic storage boxes with lids
- star pickets and their yellow caps
- hoses
- buckets
- seed
- leftover fertiliser such as citrus food, seasol, maxicrop
- gardening tools
- plant tags



Garden Hints

Watering in the summer

With the likelihood of more very high temperatures, it is important to understand the purpose of watering. The purpose is to hydrate plants very well BEFORE the hot weather hits. This means deep watering 2 -3 times in the week before the day the temperature soars. Deep watering means watering onto the earth around the roots of the plants or under the dripline of fruit trees. Have the hose running fast and count to 10 slowly to ensure there is enough water going into the soil but make sure you do not wash away soil from the roots. Filtering it through mulch works well. Then do it again at least 5 minutes later if the soil has been dry as the first watering will 'prepare' it to absorb sufficient water the second time around. Watering the leaves is next to useless, moving the hose at random up and down and around also useless, and watering shallowly or for just a second or two just a waste of water. Remember if the water does not penetrate the soil deeply, it is not

going to get to the roots of the plant and will not be drawn up through the stems and leaves and into the fruit. Watering properly also prevents blossom end rot in capsicum, tomato, eggplant and zucchini.

Bee toxins - Yates Confidor

If you have had a problem with pollination or lack thereof it may be due to the effects of a toxin found in Yates Confidor which will be removed from shelves by the end of 2018. It contains the toxin 'nicotinoid imidacloprid' which is fatal to bees and other insects in tiny concentrations. It gets into leaves and flowers and then is ingested by the bee or insect. The following link from Wikipedia goes into detail about the effect on insects. Meanwhile avoid using this product in your garden.
